If you already have covered the casual versatility of a leather coat and the conservative warmth of a good overcoat, you might like to consider one of the in-between options "of which there are many. The pea-coat is a lighter, double-breasted coat suitable for milder winters, and just as smart as a quality overcoat. The trench coat is another smart variation on the businessman's favourite "durable and good for wet weather but not nearly as warm. Duffle coats have recently become an emerging trend in certain circles, and again offer a good degree of warmth. All of these are strong choices and good alternatives to the heavier overcoat.
